****Course Description:** This course provides a theoretical framework for the understanding of the ethical, sociological, organizational, political, and legal components of community risk reduction, and a methodology for the development of a comprehensive community risk reduction plan.

****Prerequisite Knowledge and Skills:** None

Purpose of Course: *This course prepares the student to develop a comprehensive community risk reduction plan.*

Course Goals and/or Objectives: By the end of this course, students will:

1. Become champions of risk reduction.
2. Develop and meet risk reduction objectives.
3. Identify and develop intervention strategies.
4. Implement a risk reduction program.
5. Review and modify risk reduction programs.

**** How This Course Relates to the Student Learning Outcomes in the Fire emergency services program:** *Identify and evaluate organizational problems associated with fire and emergency services. Illustrate knowledge and legal application of safety, health and environmental regulations at state and federal levels. Demonstrate strong verbal and written communication skills for leadership in fire and emergency services.*

****Teaching Philosophy:** I am looking for students to demonstrate a working knowledge of the subject. You need to be creative when you complete your assignments but maintain a professional appearance of your work. Your work needs to be complete and in such a manner that someone can pick up your document and understand what you are trying to convey. **And most of all your work needs to be supported with research and cited in properly in APA format.**

****Instructional Methods:** The course is designed for individual and group interactivity. It is important to post and respond to discussion questions in the course within the time frame allotted. This provides a learning environment by networking with other students in the course.

The assignments are individual base to give you the opportunity to do a variety of activities, in many cases, similar to what you will be doing in role as a leader in the emergency services profession.
